May in our calendar is a time when Christians around the world will be celebrating **Ascension Day.** Our service will be held at **St Michael** and **All Angels church in Croft on Thursday 9 May at 7:30pm**.

The 40th day after Easter was the final day when Jesus was seen. On this day, he visited his disciples. This day, in which he was taken to heaven, is called Ascension Day. The day is also known as the Feast of Ascension or Holy Thursday, as it always falls on this day of the week. Some Christians spend the Tuesday and Wednesday before Ascension Day in prayer and fasting. These are called the Rogation Days.



So why is it called Ascension Day?

When Jesus made his final visit, he told his disciples he would always be with them, as well as promising them the gift of the Holy Spirit. He took them to the Mount of Olives, where it's believed they watched him ascend to heaven. 'Ascension' means rising to a higher level.

So how is Ascension Day celebrated?

The Feast of the Ascension is a time to reflect on Christ's headship over our lives, the church, and the world around us. In a world filled with distractions, we need a regular reminder to fix our eyes on who is really in charge.

Celebrating the Feast of Ascension is an opportunity to connect with believers across time and reflect more deeply on the headship of Christ.

So what is the Importance of the Ascension of Jesus?

The Ascension signals that Jesus' earthly work is finished. His redemptive work is done, now his intercessory work begins. As Oswald Chambers once wrote, "At His Ascension, our Lord entered heaven, and He keeps the door open for humanity to enter."

The significance of the ascension is that it is the moment Jesus's role as our mediator began in its fullness. Though we see him pray to God on mankind's behalf during his time on Earth, the ascension marks the

moment he was placed at God's right hand to intercede for us until the moment of his return.

So if you knew nothing or little of why we celebrate Ascension Day, I hope that this information helps and also that you can join us and with Christians around the world and If you have never celebrated Ascension Day before, this is the year to begin!

Time to pray for your church wardens

O Eternal God... enlighten with Thy Grace the Wardens of this church, and so rule their minds and guide their counsels, that in all things they may seek Thy Holy Will... Amen.

O Lord, ...we beseech Thee to bless all who, ...give themselves to the service of their fellow worshipers. Endue them with wisdom, patience and courage to strengthen the weak and raise up those who fall... that they may worthily minister in Thy Name to the suffering, the friendless and the needy... Amen (Prayers from the C of E)

Churchwardens have a vital and historical role in the life of the church. They are elected by the parish, not just the members of the church. Anyone in the parish can vote for them, not just people on the church's electoral roll.

So, if you want to be a churchwarden, just invite your neighbours on the day of the parish meetings in church!

Wardens used to have a significant role in the wider life of the parish with responsibilities for charity, poor relief and even bridges and roads.

Their church duties today include:

Maintaining order and decency in the church and churchyard, especially during the time of divine service
Being entrusted with the property of the church
Having a duty to cooperate with the vicar
Encouraging parishioners in practice of "true religion"

Quite a job! These are their legal duties, but I also like the prayer above as it reminds us to pray for them to seek God's will, not theirs or ours, but God's, and to strengthen the weak and encourage the fallen.

They may feel most of the time that they are weak and have fallen, but they are equipped with our support and prayers to look after other people who need strength or support - which is probably most of us at times!

Recovery and resilience

Of course, Burundi continues to be one of the toughest places on earth to live. The future is uncertain and challenges wait for families like Aline's around every corner.

When a ferocious storm destroyed Aline's home, almost killing her and her children, she was able to recover by selling the cows she'd



been keeping. Now when crisis threatens her family's survival, Aline has options. Even a small business can provide just enough resilience to weather the most brutal of storms here in Burundi.

Aline cannot only look ahead to her children's future now, but her own too.

Naturally, Aline wants security as she ages.

In the next five years she hopes to expand her current wholesale business by selling a range of goods, so that one day she can buy a mill. This will provide a source of income without the need to transport heavy goods over long distances.

Aline told us: 'This is not a dream. It is a plan, and I will do it. I am a woman who is an achiever.'

The difference with Christian Aid

Aline's long and difficult journey out of extreme poverty began with a little support, knowledge and faith from Christian Aid supporters like you.

May: Julian

Now here's a curious anomaly. The name Julian, is primarily a male name but it is here applied to a female! But its origins apply equally well to a male or female in its forms of Juliana, Julie or Julianne.

It is quite a flattering name, meaning youthful. The fourth century Roman Emperor bore the name Julian and several notable people throughout the Empire bore it as a second name.

In England, however, many people will understand it as the name of a remarkable woman who lived in Norwich in the fourteenth century. It is believed that she took the name Julian from the church adjacent to her hermit's cell, to which she had retreated following a serious illness in her early thirties. And it was from there that she offered wisdom, spiritual guidance and solace to people living through the turbulence of a country suffering from warfare, plague and religious persecution. Though she describes herself as 'unlettered', (probably lacking an understanding of Latin) she produced a remarkable (and highly illegal) book of meditations on the visions she had during the crisis point in her illness. It is remarkable in being written in English, by a woman, and was hidden from sight for centuries, until it was finally found and eventually translated by Grace Warrack in the early twentieth century. The story of how that came about is a detective story on its own, but since then it has never been out of print.

'The Heart of the Village'

'You cannot understand anything properly without knowing its pre-text or its con-text' (Father David Sanders OP)

Quite some years ago three people got together to produce what we hoped was a fairly approachable book about St.Michael's Church, Stoney Stanton. At the time we had limited resources - it was to be printed on existing machinery which we had at parish disposal, but thanks to Microsoft Publisher and a supply of lovely line drawings by Carol Ford, we were able to bring into being a nice little booklet, which has been well appreciated over the years.

But recently one of the earlier team had been in contact with a professional printing firm and the suggestion was made that we produce an expanded version of the same booklet, giving a more generous context to the story of Church and village. This followed a great deal of research, which had also been undertaken with regard to the lives of those buried in the churchyard, the 'sleeping souls' of the book, and it was decided to include a selection of these as well as an updated and more rounded history of the whole.

And so the latest edition came into being, with old photos of the village, and extra sections giving a 'spotlight' on areas which interested us, and which we hoped would interest others. Sadly one of the team was no longer with us, but we were able to expand his section with a gentle update, and other areas of interest to village life were 'coloured in' so that eventually it reached the stage where it was ready for the printers. By Easter it was being distributed to the church and the library.

We hope that this new edition will encourage present villagers to respect the story which a building such as St. Michael's gathers to itself over the years, and perhaps encourage newcomers to realise that even an ordinary place like our village has its own very individual history, told through the account of past inhabitants who have all played their part in its continuing existence.

life. She started by participating in a transformative three-day community workshop, funded by Christian Aid.



'I came out with amazing knowledge and skills. The trainer restored a sense of hope and energy in me,' says Aline.

She was taught how to form a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) and establish a steady income. VSLAs mean people can save for their future and borrow money to kickstart small rural businesses. With all she had

learned, Aline's dream of getting her children back finally felt possible.

Building a business

With a small start-up loan, Aline started trading avocados and peanuts locally. With her profits, she bought a bicycle so she could transport greater quantities of goods to markets further afield. Eventually, her hard work had finally paid off, and she had earned the money she needed to rent a house.

Once Aline secured a home for herself, her three eldest sons were able to escape their father and join her. They told Aline that their father had abused them and sent their three young siblings to live with different members of his family.

Aline still hopes that she'll be reunited with her youngest children in time.

Today, Aline lives peacefully on her own plot of land in a remote village in the Kayogoro Commune in Makamba Province. She's baked her own bricks and is building a strong home for her and her children in every sense.

Now Aline can afford food, clothes and essential healthcare for her family. She's also purchased solar panels so her children can do their evening homework by electric light.

"I like to feed my family with the produce that I grow, such as beans, vegetables and corn. I am so happy that we are together. Now my children feel supported as they have a parent who can meet their needs." - Aline.

Aline's story



How Christian Aid helped Aline transform her life and climb out of extreme poverty.

Poverty pushed Aline to the brink of survival. She was abused, homeless and hungry. But Aline pushed back harder.

Driven by hope, faith and the love

of her children, Aline was able to fight against the inhumanity of poverty and build herself a new life

Life in Burundi

In Burundi, malnourishment and poverty affect more than 70% of the population, making survival a daily struggle. Jobs and food are hard to come by, and those who have homes often have no electricity or running water.

For Aline, life was a constant struggle. She was married young and gave birth to her eldest son, Fisto, when she was just 14 years old. Aline experienced constant abuse at the hands of her violent husband.



A few years later, Aline faced even more devastation. Her husband married another woman, forcing Aline to flee. He prevented her from taking their children with her, and in a further act of cruelty, told the local community that Aline was mentally ill and unable to care for her children.

"I wandered the streets, asking anyone for a place to sleep. Those who showed me kindness would let me stay for two or three days, but it was difficult. People would insult me and treat me with contempt. They forgot I was a human being. It filled me with sorrow."

Why your television is like the Trinity

Here is a trick question: How many colours does your television set use?

Answer: Just three: red, green and blue. And in that order, just like a rainbow (where reds are at one side, blues at the opposite side, green in the middle). This is known as "RGB".

These are TV's three primary colours which, when their luminescence is fired at your eyes, give all the colours of the visible spectrum. These are all 'additive' colours. In fact, mix these three together in different proportions, and your screen can offer you 16 million colours.

You thought the sequence was red/yellow/blue? No, that's for painted or printed colours. A TV set positively gives out light in three different colours, whereas paint daubed on paper absorbs and removes some colours, to reflect back merely a small part of the light falling on it the colour that you see.

You'll soon call out the repair man if your television loses one of its three colours and all the presenters look as though they came from Mars. But change the intensity of any one colour (red, green or blue) even slightly and you change the overall colour.

Switch them all off, and you are left with black. Let all three of them shine at full brightness, at the same point – and then as if by magic you have a totally different colour: WHITE!

It's a parable which illustrates the Holy Trinity. Three completely distinct persons (Father, Son and Holy Spirit), just as your TV set has three quite separate colours: red, green, blue.

Take away any One member of the Trinity, and you slip into theological error; take away any one of the three colours, and you call out the TV repair engineer!



90 years ago, on 25 May 1934 that the British composer, Gustav Holst, died. Best known for *The Planets*.


Also 90 years ago, on 28 May 1934 that the first Glyndebourne opera festival was held, in East Sussex.

60 years ago, on 2 May 1964 that Nancy Astor, American-born British politician died. She was the first female Member of Parliament (MP) to take her seat in the House of Commons.

50 years ago, on 24 May 1974 that Duke Ellington, American jazz pianist, composer, and big-band leader, died. Regarded as the greatest jazz composer of the 20th century.

40 years ago, on 17 May 1984 that Prince Charles described a proposed extension to the National Gallery in London as a 'monstrous carbuncle on the face of a much-loved and elegant friend'. (The design was scrapped, but his comment sparked controversy over the Royal Family's role.).

Also 40 years ago, on 19 May 1984 that John Betjeman, British poet, writer, and broadcaster died. He was Poet Laureate 1972-1984.

30 years ago, on 6 May 1994 that the Channel Tunnel linking England and France was officially opened.

Also 30 years ago, on 10 May 1994 that Nelson Mandela was inaugurated as South Africa's first black president, after more than 300 years of white rule.

25 years ago, on 1 May 1999 that the body of mountaineer George Mallory was found on Mount Everest. He had been missing since 1924.

Also 25 years ago, on 6 May 1999, that the first general elections for the Scottish Parliament and the National Assembly for Wales, took place. Donald Dewar became First Minister for Scotland and Alun Michael became First Secretary for Wales.

20 years ago, on 19 May 2004 that the world's first stem cell bank opened at the National Institute for Biological Standards and Control in Potter's Bar, Hertfordshire.

The Story behind the Hymn – 'Praise my Soul the King of Heaven'

Praise my soul the King of heaven, To His feet thy tribute bring; Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven, Evermore his praises sing. Alleluia! Alleluia! Praise the everlasting King.

Praise Him for His grace and favour To our fathers in distress; Praise Him, still the same as ever, Slow to chide and swift to bless. Alleluia! Alleluia! Glorious in His faithfulness.

Fatherlike, He tends and spares us; Well our feeble frame He knows; In His hands He gently bears us, Rescues us from all our foes. Alleluia! Alleluia! Widely yet His mercy flows.

Angels in the height, adore Him, Ye behold Him face to face; Sun and moon bow down before Him, Dwellers all in time and space; Praise Him! Praise him! Praise with us the God of grace!

By Henry Francis Lyte (1793-1847)

This stately poetic paraphrase of Psalm 103 has been included in probably more solemn ceremonies than any other hymn in the English language. It was even chosen by Queen Elizabeth for her wedding to the Duke of Edinburgh in 1947.

Henry Lyte had been a brilliant theological student at university in Dublin, with a gift for versifying. After graduation he moved to a tiny and remote parish in County Wexford to serve his curacy. It was here, when he was about 25, that Henry had a religious experience which would transform his life.


"Well, well," said the old gentleman to some boys who were playing cricket. "I wish I could join your game, but I'm too old."

"Not at all," replied one of the boys politely. "In fact, we need you. Our ball has just gone through that window. You can go and ask for it back."

A close friend of his, another clergyman, had fallen ill, and was clearly dying. Henry went to visit him. The friend was not as distressed as Henry had imagined he would be. Instead, the friend confessed that he had been re-reading the New Testament, with an eye on eternity, and had made a great discovery. There was no need to rely on religious duties and formalities and good deeds to gain peace with God. Instead, we can trust completely in the mercy of Christ and His saving power.

Henry was sophisticated and had been very formal in his ministry. But this encounter with his friend's faith at death's very door, made him reconsider his faith. He wrote later that his dear friend 'who died happy in the thought that there was One who would atone for his delinquencies' made him 'study my Bible and preach in another manner than I had previously done'. And soon after this hymn appeared, in 1834.

Lyte rejoices in the majesty and wonder of the living God, who in turn loves us. He captures the measure of the Psalm in enduring lyrics, which combine time, eternity, God and man all swept up into one embrace. Its last verse summons all the created order to join in a great act of joyous praise – surely a preview of eternity!



Don't just sit there, whatever you do!

The average adult in the UK sits for nine hours a day. Office workers probably clock up even more time in a chair.

But it is not good for you. Research has found that too much sitting increases your risk of weight gain, Type 2 diabetes, osteoporosis, depression, anxiety, stress, cancer, and even early death.

"Excessive sedentary time is associated with a plethora of physical and mental health complications," says Prof Lee Smith, an expert in physical activity and sedentary behaviour at Anglia Ruskin University.

And James Betts, professor of metabolic physiology at the University of Bath, says that sitting too much may also lead to weaker and less flexible muscles. "Using your muscles and loading your bones can definitely strengthen them – or conversely, disuse can rapidly make them weaker," he says.

The good thing is that too much sitting can be easily dealt with. Simply interrupt your sitting with activity breaks. Get up and walk around during every TV advert break. Walk around during phone calls. Go for a walk after dinner. Use the stairs whenever you can.

The good news is that other studies have found that if you make time for even short bursts of exercise during your day, it will help to offset the harm of too much sitting.
